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C-SPAN ANNOUNCES 75 WINNERS FOR 2012 STUDENTCAM DOCUMENTARY COMPETITION

Grand Prize Winner highlights Fifth Amendment as an important part of the U.S. Constitution

WASHINGTON (March 7, 2012) – **Matthew Shimura**, a ninth-grader at Punahou School in Hawaii, will receive \$5,000 as Grand Prize winner in C-SPAN's 2012 StudentCam competition. In looking at the competition's theme, "***The Constitution and You: Select any provision of the U.S. Constitution and create a video illustrating why it's important to you,***" Matthew highlighted the Fifth Amendment in his video, "[The Constitution and the Camps: Due Process and the Japanese-American Internment](#)". First Prize winners **Carl Colglazier** and **Leo Pfeifer** discussed Intellectual Property and the First Amendment, respectively. Each will receive \$3,000 for their work.

Shimura, Colglazier, and Pfeifer are three of the 148 students across the country who are sharing a total of \$50,000 in prizes for their videos. In addition to the grand prize and first prize winners, C-SPAN is awarding eight 2nd prizes, 16 3rd prizes, and 48 honorable mentions. The winners will be announced today during C-SPAN's live viewer call-in program, *Washington Journal*.

The national competition, now in its eighth year, invited all middle school students (grades 6-8) and high school students (grades 9-12) to produce a five-to eight-minute documentary focusing on any provision of the Constitution that means the most to them. Students from 43 states, DC, and Puerto Rico submitted a record number 1,203. The top three winning topics are:

- 1st Amendment
- Article I (Structure and Powers of Congress)
- 26th Amendment (Voting Rights for 18 year olds)

"C-SPAN's StudentCam continues to be a snapshot of what young people consider important," says Joanne Wheeler, C-SPAN Vice President of Education Relations. "In yet another record-breaking year for entries, students across the country continue to demonstrate just how much their voices count, especially when it comes to the foundation of our government, the Constitution."

The top 27 videos will air on C-SPAN, one each day, starting Sunday, April 1, at 6:50 a.m. ET, followed by an interview with the winning student at 9:15 a.m. ET during C-SPAN's "Washington Journal."
